

From the Pastor's Desk...

Today is the Fourth Sunday of Easter. The visit of Paul and Barnabas to Antioch occurs early in Paul's first missionary



journey through the Diaspora, the regions where Jews were dispersed beyond Israel. Today's reading describes the pattern of all three of Paul's journeys. He begins by preaching on the Sabbath in the Synagogue, where he speaks to his fellow Jews, centering his preaching on Jesus' resurrection from the dead. When great crowds come, the Jewish leadership express opposition to Jesus' teaching. The Jewish rejection of Paul's preaching is the catalyst for Paul to take the message to the Gentiles, who respond with delight. This causes further hostility and persecution by the Jewish leaders, who expel the two from their territory. Paul then goes to other communities and encounters similar opposition from Jewish leadership and acceptance by Gentiles.

Revelation, the last book of the New Testament fulfills the promises made in the first book of the Old Testament, Genesis. The great crowds bring to mind the multitude of descendants promised to Abraham, now comprising both Jew and Gentiles from every nation who stand before God's throne and before the lamb. Note that John does not use Jesus' name in this vision, but instead refers to him as the lamb. By using the image of the lamb (which he does 29 times in Revelations), John evokes both the sacrificial lamb and the lamb led to slaughter with both images alluding to the death of Jesus. In a striking poetic reversal, the lamb becomes the shepherd, leading the multitude to springs of life-giving water.

This gospel passage is the final and high point of the discourse in which Jesus identifies himself as the good shepherd. We're told that the sheep hear and follow; Jesus knows and gives. Hearing is an essential component of faith and discipleship. Having heard the voice of the shepherd, the flock then follows him, a verb used throughout the gospels to signify becoming a shepherd. As the sheep hear his voice. Jesus reveals to them

the oneness he has with his Father. Jesus and his father protect the sheep; no one can snatch them out of Jesus' hand.

This weekend is Mother's Day, and we wish all of our mothers a blessed and relaxing day. Today's bulletin contains the names of your mothers and grandmothers, both living and deceased, who you wish particularly remembered during our Masses.

Celebrant of our Masses this weekend is Father Michael DeMartinis, chaplain at Villa Maria Academy and director of theater for Villa and Prep. I am in Ft. Worth, TX to baptize the son of very good friends. I married Keith and Stephany in Sacramento, CA six years ago and I'm now privileged to baptize their first born. I flew down on Friday and will be home Sunday afternoon.

Bishop George Murry of the neighboring diocese of Youngstown announced recently that registered parishioners have declined 36 percent since 2000 and that regular weekend Mass attendance is down by over 60 percent in the same time period. First Communion, Confirmations and Marriages are one third the number they were in 2000. He also noted the decline in the number of active priests. As of 2000 there were 116 priests in active duty in the diocese. This declined to 73 in 2018 and the diocese estimated the number of priests will fall to 55 in 2025. Thirteen priests are over 71 years old, and more than half of the priests are over the age of 60. Regular Mass attendance in the diocese numbered 107,000 in 2000, falling below 81,000 by 2010 and under 41,000 by 2018, a decline of more than 50 percent in 18 years. The diocese is beginning a consultation process to determine how to downsize, combine parishes, etc.

During the month of March, our Food Pantry served 443 families which included 204 children and 88 elderly. We distributed 16,830 pounds of food at a cost to the parish of \$646.71. Once again I did not have to take any parish funds to pay this bill; simply because of your ongoing generous support of the Food Pantry. Always remember that when we help the poor and those in need, God always overlooks a multitude of our failings and sins.

If you have not yet made a pledge to the Catholic Services Appeal, would you at least think about helping with this annual drive. Each parish is assessed a set amount. Our assessment this year is \$88,000. Any money we raise over that amount remains in the parish. Last year our assessment was \$74,000 and we raised \$118,000 which meant that all of that money raised over the assessment remained in the parish. The CSA is also the largest source of income for the diocese.

A couple of years ago we established the St. Patrick Foundation, an account that exists solely for the ongoing maintenance and upkeep of St. Patrick's Church. None of the monies in this account can be used for operating expenses. At present we have approximately \$250,000 in the Foundation. In addition, when Mary McCarthy died last year, she and her late husband had left \$39,000 to the Catholic Foundation and the income from that can only be used for the maintenance and upkeep of the church. Perhaps in your estate planning, you might consider a bequest to the St. Patrick Foundation so that this beautiful church can be preserved for years to come. We have a treasure and we have to hand it on.

George Phillips, an elderly man from Walled Lake Michigan, was going up to bed, when his wife told him that he'd left the light on in the garden shed, which she could see from the bedroom window. George opened the back door to go turn off the light, but saw that there were people in the shed stealing things. He phoned the police, who asked, "Is someone in your house?" "No," he replied, but they are breaking into my garden shed and stealing from me. The police dispatcher said, "All patrols are busy, you should lock your doors and windows and an officer will be along when one is available." George hung up the phone and counted to 30. Then he phoned the police again. "I just called a few seconds ago because there were people stealing things from my shed. Well, you don't have to worry about them because I just shot and killed them both; the dogs are eating them right now," and he hung up. Four minutes later, six police cars, a SWAT team, a helicopter, two fire trucks, a paramedic and an ambulance showed up at the Phillips residence, and caught the burglars red-handed. One of the policemen said to George, "I thought you said you'd shot them." George said, "I thought you said there was nobody available." Don't fool with old people.
