

Today is the Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time. Jeremiah describes the future, hope for trip home from exile and the



people's song: "The Lord has delivered his people, the remnant of Israel." This refrain provides hope for the community in exile, who await a new exodus, a triumphant return home. Then the prophet announces the divine plan. God will bring them back from where they had been exiled, the land of the north. He will gather the new Israel and lead them by streams of water on pleasant paths, water being a sign of God's attentive love. Among them are the most vulnerable, the blind, lame, pregnant and those about to give birth. God will accompany them on the journey.

The Letter to the Hebrews works out the doctrine of the high priesthood of Jesus Christ. We find three essential gualifications here: (1) a priest, the link between God and humans, was appointed on behalf of humans to deal with things concerning God. The priest's special function was to offer sacrifice for the people's sins. (2) The priest was one with humans, toward whom he lived with sympathy. He was identified with humans to such an extent that he offered sacrifice for his own sin before offering it for the sins of others. He is to deal gently and patiently with others while not condoning their faults. He does not give way to anger with them, but through patient sympathy he directs people back to the right way. (3) A third essential qualification is that no person appoints himself a priest. Priesthood is not a job, it is a calling. It is God who calls, not humans.

Jesus' instruction to his disciples about his Passion is bracketed by the cure of the blind person of Bethsaida. This narrative represents a parable in action: the physical sight granted to Bartimaeus symbolizes the insight necessary for a disciple. Significant are details about the blind man's condition and attitude: the energy and insistence of his petition, the lack of concern with his wardrobe when Jesus calls him, his faith and his

simple dialogue with Jesus. The language here implies theology: Bartimaeus' faith is said to have saved him—it healed him physically and brought him salvation—with the result that he follows Jesus "on the way." It is significant that before he is healed, he shouts to Jesus as the "Son of David." That term was synonymous with Messiah which is the term Simon Peter used of Jesus. Batimaeus leaves behind his cloak, leaps up to follow Jesus, and follow him to Jerusalem. We are called to do the same.

New data reveals that the divorce rate in America has dropped 18 percent from 2008 to 2016, according to analysis by the University of Maryland. The data shows that young couples are approaching relationships very differently from baby boomers, who married young, divorced, remarried and so on. Generation X and especially Millennials are being pickier about who they marry, tying the knot at older ages when education, careers and finances are on track.

Young people get the credit for fewer divorces because boomers have continued to divorce at unusually high rates, all the way into their 60s and 70s. From 1990 to 2015, according to Bowling Green's National Center for Family and Marriage Research, the divorce rate doubled for people aged 55 to 64, and even tripled for Americans 65 and older. Today's young couples don't seem to be following the same path. "One of the reasons for the decline is that the married population is getting older and more highly educated. Fewer people are getting married, and those who do are the sort of people who are least likely to get divorced.

Many poorer and less educated Americans are opting not to get married at all. They're living together, and often raising kids together, but deciding not to tie the knot. Studies have shown that these cohabitating relationships are less stable than they used to be. Fewer divorces, therefore, are not only bad news for matrimonial lawyers but a sign of American's widening chasm of inequality. Marriage is becoming a more durable, but a far more exclusive, institution.

Our Food Pantry served 395 families during the month off September which included 90 elderly,

181 children and 50 new individuals this month. We distributed 10,649 pounds of food at a cost of \$452.99, all of which was covered because of your ongoing generosity in supporting the Food Pantry.

A concert on the newly restored Jacox Memorial Pipe Organ will take place on Sunday afternoon, October 28, at 4 PM in church. The concert is open to the public at no cost. Guest organist is Peter Knippel from Chicago. The concert will include two numbers by our own church choir.

Thursday is the feast of All Saints, a holyday. The Mass is at noon in the church.

We recently widened the rectory driveway. That driveway has been very narrow and, especially during the Irish Festival, the trucks break up the lawn. So we decided to widen it to better accommodate all of the traffic. There is a small parking lot behind the rectory that can accommodate about ten cars as well as the garage for the rectory.

During the month of October each year, we have to submit to the diocese what is called the October count. It is a counting of the number of people who attend Mass each weekend in October as well as the number of hosts which we distribute. This annual count helps the diocese and the National Conference of Bishops keep track of trends of the numbers of people attending and those receiving communion.

Vatican II moved us away from the Last Rites to the Sacrament of the sick. The elderly and those who are seriously ill should receive the sacrament, and families shouldn't wait until someone is near death to request the sacrament.

There were 11 people (10 men and one woman) hanging on a rope that came down from a helicopter. They all decided that one person should get off, because if they didn't, the rope would break and everyone would die. No one could decide who should go, so finally, the woman gave a really touching speech saying how she would give up her life to save the others because women were used to giving up things for their husbands and children, giving in to men, and not receiving anything in return. When she finally finished speaking, all of the men started clapping.
